What to expect as an asylum seeker in Wales

Are there others like me in Wales?

Although asylum seekers make up only about 0.1% of the population, there are around 3,000 people seeking asylum living in Wales. Charities such as Welsh Refugee Council can help you find a support network and make friends.

How long will it take to get a decision on my asylum application?

The asylum process in the UK can take a long time, often longer than 6 months. If you appeal the decision it can take even longer.

Can I work whilst I'm waiting for my application to be resolved?



Generally, asylum seekers are not allowed to work, but you can apply for permission to work if you have waited over 12 months for an initial decision on your asylum claim or for a response to a further submission for asylum, and you are not considered responsible for the delay in decision-making.


If I'm not allowed to work, will I receive any financial support?



You have a right to financial support if you are not able to financially support yourself while your asylum claim is heard. You will be entitled to a specific allowance for asylum seekers which is £39.60 per week. Charities across Wales can offer you additional help with food, clothing or even bikes! Can my children go to school?

Yes, education is compulsory in the UK for all children aged 5-16. You will need to enrol your children at the local state school where you live. If you are entitled to financial support or housing, you should also be able to access free school meals for your children. At Welsh Refugee Council we run free play sessions for children and out of school holiday programmes.



I've heard the phrase 'illegal asylum seeker'. Is what I'm doing illegal?

There is no such thing as an 'illegal' asylum seeker. Under international law (1951 Convention and 1967 Protocol on Refugees) everyone has the right to apply for asylum in the UK. In seeking sanctuary, you are exercising a human right.

But I've heard I could be detained by immigration authorities?

Unfortunately, UK immigration authorities have the right to detain asylum seekers indefinitely, even if they have not committed a crime. If this happens, you should have access to a lawyer who can help you understand your rights. RightToRemain.org.uk have a <u>checklist</u> on how to be prepared in case you are detained.

Can I access healthcare?

Yes, you have a right to access the National Health Service (NHS) for free, as well as free dental care and prescription medicines. It can be confusing knowing what you need to do and to register for the right services. You can contact Welsh Refugee Council for help or speak to other asylum seekers who have already been through the process. There is also more information on healthcare in Wales on the Welsh Government Sanctuary website.
